to the designs. Somebody spent a lot of time formulating and choosing those designs. The state quarters are something more than coins to have errors (David has found them all for North Carolina.) or something to put in vending machines. So let's have a look to see how close

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you have been paying attention. There are still five designs to be released, so some of the answers might well change before next year is over, but so what!

OF THE STATE QUARTERS issued through Idaho:

- 1. Which ones show the out line of the state?
- 2. Which show maps that include more territory than just the state issuing the quarter?
- 3. Which ones show identified (not necessarily recognizable) people?
- 4. Which show recognizable geological features? There is at least one controversial one here.
- 5. Which one of these geological features disapeared after the coin was issued?
- 6. Which ones show bridges?
- 7. Which show boats or ships?
- 8. Which show horses? How many?
- 9. Which show bovids (cow or cow-like animals)?
- 10. Which show flowers?
- 11. Which show wheeled vehichles? There's a sneaky one here.
- 12. Which ones are taken from statues? I'm not sure here.

- 13. Which shows a city on state's map?
- 14. Which show trees? Lots of trees in some cases?
- 15. How many musical instruments are shown on how many designs?
- 16. How many depict specific historical events. One commemmorates my grandparents' wedding day.
- 17. Which had the largest mintage to date?
- 18. Which had the smallest mintage to date.
- 19. How many crabs?
- 20. Coming from me, you had to know that you would eventually be asked: What states show birds?

Lastly, let's hear your vote for your favorite of the designs. Are you looking for history, for symbolism, for art, or for nature.

Almost every year for the last five years there has been an exhibit at the American Numismatic Association World's Fair of Money that attempts to rank the quarter designs by some criterion: artisic merit, historical significance, or some such. Interestingly North Carolina's quarter design has ranked high in each.
